Chief Prock gave a report on pedestrian barrier recommendations. Recommendations were to use decorative railings in place permanently between 12th Ave North and 7th Ave North using bike barricades only for special occasions as needed. Breaks would be located at intersections and crosswalks. Also proposed was reducing Boulevard from 4 lanes to 3 lanes, 14th Ave – 9th Ave and increasing sidewalk width by 5 feet for greater pedestrian flow. Estimated cost \$1.1 million – Decorative railing \$165/linear foot \$650,000, 5 foot sidewalk width expansion \$450,000.
