WHEREAS, the 125th South Carolina General Assembly will commence its two-year session on January 10, 2023; and

WHEREAS, tourism is the State's leading industry, and with approximately 20 million visitors to the Grand Strand, the City of Myrtle Beach is one of the state's busiest tourist destinations; and

WHEREAS, over the years the State of South Carolina and the City of Myrtle Beach have enjoyed a collaborative and productive partnership; and

WHEREAS, the Myrtle Beach City Council met to review the 2023 legislative session and discuss priorities for the upcoming session;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Myrtle Beach, in Council duly assembled:

1. City Council hereby adopts the following priorities as its 2023 State Legislative Priorities:

Economic Development

 <u>Downtown Revitalization</u>: Encourage and support State collaboration and partnerships to further the City's Downtown Revitalization. The City has made, and continues to make, a significant investment into Downtown Revitalization with over \$100 million either expended or planned to be expended over the next year.

The next phase of improvements includes:

 Historic Renovation of three buildings on Main Street into a performance theater/performing arts center (\$12,800,000 million dollars).

 Extensive infrastructure investment throughout the downtown area that will include, but is not be limited to, stormwater, sewer, road re-alignment, underground utilities, streetscape improvements, and pedestrian enhancements among other infrastructure. This infrastructure is necessary to support the revitalization of downtown (\$27,000,000 million dollars).

Economic analysis conservatively forecasts the impact to the revitalized downtown to be in excess of \$300 million in private investment that is anticipated to spin off in excess of \$50 million in various tax revenues over the next decade

 Convention Center Revitalization: Support state assistance in further renovations and rehabilitation to the Myrtle Beach Convention Center's lobby and atrium. The Myrtle Beach Convention Center attracts an estimated 750,000 visitors annually, and is a major economic impact driver in the state and region (\$10,500,000 million dollars).
