Rolling, mobile library provides books on the go!

Say "hello" to Myrtle Beach's first-ever bookmobile. The city's new library-on-wheels debuted in March and is making the rounds already, visiting neighborhoods, community centers and assisted living facilities.

The city's Chapin Memorial Library received a \$200,000 grant from the Chapin Foundation in 2023 to purchase a van and equip it as a mobile library. The vehicle's cabin space stores more than 900 items.

Patrons can check out, renew and exchange books came from the actual library or the mobile library.

Hurricane evacuation zones changing for 2024 season

The South Carolina Emergency Management Division updated its hurricane evacuation zones along the coast, including those for Myrtle Beach and the Grand Strand.

New for 2024, Evacuation Zones A and B are smaller than before for Myrtle Beach. Zone C is smaller, too, but it now includes the Market Common area for the first time.

The new Zone A includes the beach and both sides of Ocean Boulevard, as shown on the map below. Our Zone B now stretches from Ocean Boulevard to the east side of Kings Highway.

Evacuation Zone C encompasses all of the Market Common area, west of Kings Highway and south of Myrtle Beach International Airport.



When a hurricane threatens, officials mav call for Zones A. B or C to be evacuated, depending on the path and expected storm surge strength. Know your NEW zone!

The changes follow a statewide study of updated flood from the bookmobile. You can also register for a library zone maps, recent hurricane events and reports of actual card, enjoy free WiFi and return books, whether they flooding. Hurricane season is June 1 through November 30.

Skaters welcome new bowl at park

Skaters are thrilled with a new bowl to test their shredding skills at Matt Hughes Skate Park, near Doug Shaw Memorial Stadium and Pepper Geddings Recreation Center. The cement bowl is five feet deep, 30 feet wide and 50 feet long. It replaced an original wooden half-pipe that had served the skating public for more than 20 years.

The Friends of the Skateparks Foundation contributed a \$35,000 grant toward the \$95,000 addition. All ages came to try out the new bowl during ribbon-cutting ceremonies on Saturday, February 10. Skateboarders and roller-bladers took turns testing the curves and edges of the new bowl. Helmets are required, of course.

'Pardon our A&I progress' in downtown Myrtle Beach!

As the sign says, work is underway downtown to build a new Arts & Innovation District, thanks in part to a \$5 million grant from the State of South Carolina. In all, the city is accomplishing \$34 million of infrastructure work to build a foundation for growth.



Current city construction projects include stormwater retention ponds, underground utilities, water and sewer line improvements and new street scapes.

Eager to be part of the progress, new businesses have opened in renovated stores on Ninth Avenue North and Broadway Street, including several new restaurants.

City Council recently approved an agreeement with Coastal Carolina University for a 300-seat theater on Main Street in the old Broadway Movie House. CCU will manage the theatre and use it for drama and performing arts courses. That's an additional \$12 million project that will bring more life and activity to the downtown area.

The SC Department of Transportation is expected to begin realignment this year of US 501 along Seventh Avenue North, from Broadway Street to US 17. That project is funded by RIDE III.




Kayak launch and foot bridge coming to Thunderbolt Park

Work is underway at Thunderbolt Park on Farrow Parkway, just west of the Market Common, to build a kayak-launching pier. When complete this spring, it will allow lake access for kayaks and paddleboards. For now, it's BYOK (Bring Your Own Kayak).

A long-awaited footbridge to complete the multipurpose path around Thunderbolt Lake also will be installed this spring at the western-most end of the park. The lake is part of the greater Grand Park system serving the former Myrtle Beach Air Force Base.

In other park news, Warbird Park received new lighting along its paths and displays to allow for longer hours. The World War II Memorial is beautifully lighted at night, as are the military planes, and path lighting throughout the park will provide more access.

A new Vietnam War Memorial is planned in next year's budget. to recognize Vietnam veterans and the former Air Force Base's role.



Everyone is invited to join this year's Jack Platt Veterans March at 9:00 a.m., Monday, May 27. Jack was a World War II veteran who wanted to honor other veterans and their families on Memorial Day. The walk begins at 16th Avenue North on Ocean Boulevard.

Include enough supplies in the emergency kit for all family members to have a minimum of three days' food, water, medicine and other items. Batteries and flashlights are vital in a power outage.

Don't forget your pets! Have evacuation plans for Fido and Felix, too, as most shelters do not accept pets. Do advance research on pet-friendly hotels or accommodations in areas away from the coast.

When the time comes, fill the car with gas and check in with relatives when you get to your destination. Having a family contact point will keep everyone posted.

State regulates how golf carts may drive on streets

Golf carts are allowed on public streets, but state law regulates how and when, along with who is allowed to



drive them. When on the road, golf carts must be insured and registered with the SC Department of Motor Vehicles. Here are the operating rules for the street:

- Only by a licensed driver.
- · Only when insured and registered.
- Only during daylight hours.
- Only on secondary roads where the speed limit is 35 miles per hour or less.
- Only up to four miles from the registered address.
- Not on primary roads (Kings Highway or US 501).
- Not on sidewalks, bike lanes or multipurpose paths.
- Not with more people than seats in the golf cart.
- Not by unlicensed children of any age.

Seasonal beach and biking rules begin May 1

Several beach and boardwalk rules change for the summer season when May arrives. From May 1 through Labor Day, dogs and bicycles are allowed on the beach only before 10:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

At all times when dogs are allowed on the beach or boardwalk, they must be on a leash of seven feet or shorter, and you must pick up and properly dispose of their droppings.

The pick-up-after-your-pet law is in place whenever the dog is off the owner's property. Violations are misdemeanors, subject to fines of up to \$500 and/or 30 days in jail. Handy pet disposal bags are available at most city parks.
