***NOTE:** City laws are known as ordinances. Before a city ordinance can be enacted it must be introduced (1st Reading) and then approved (2nd Reading). Resolutions are normally actions through which City Council reinforces or makes policy not rising to the level of law. Motions are generally related to direction from City Council to city staff to take certain actions.*

Resolution 2020-031 – Resolution to declare the weekends (Friday through Sunday) from Friday June 19, 2020, through Sunday September 6, 2020, as Extraordinary Events.

1st Reading Ordinance 2020-34 to amend 19-178 and 19-180 to:

- **Declare events of any description with an anticipated or actual estimated attendance of more than 10,000 people to be an Extraordinary Event.**
- **Declare the “NOPI” and “Mustang” (and other similar events) to be Extraordinary Events based upon the history of disorderly, unruly and sometimes unlawful behavior, including but not limited to: noise ordinance violations, motor vehicle violations and resulting traffic congestion.**
- **Declare Memorial Day Weekend (Thursday through Monday), July 4th Week (July 2-7) and Labor Day Weekend (Thursday through Monday) as Extraordinary Events.**
- **Delete section 19-178 (e) referencing motorcycle events immediately preceding, and taking place on, Memorial Day.**
- **Authorize the Chief of Police (with the concurrence of the City Manager) to temporarily close businesses when it is necessary to insure the safety of the public. Such action shall be taken only upon the failure of at least one previous effort to achieve compliance, and to be effective only from the moment of such order until that business normally reopens (but no sooner than four hours later).**

- **To authorize the City Manager to impose a curfew in certain areas of the city as necessary to maintain public safety and good order.**

EXECUTIVE SESSION – Council may take action on matters discussed in Executive Session which are deemed to be “emergency” concerns.

NOTE: *South Carolina law requires that Council’s business is conducted in public with limited exceptions, known as “Executive Sessions.” Subjects eligible for Executive Session include:*

- *Personnel matters.*
- *Negotiations concerning proposed contractual arrangements and proposed sale or purchase of property.*
- *The receipt of legal advice relating to:*
 - *A pending, threatened, or potential claim.*
 - *Other matters covered by the attorney-client privilege. Settlement of legal claims, or the position of the city in other adversary situations.*
- *Discussions regarding development of security personnel or devices.*
- *Investigative proceedings regarding allegations of criminal misconduct.*
- *Matters relating to the proposed location, expansion, or provision of services encouraging location or expansion of industries or other businesses.*

Motions to go into Executive Session must be made in public and specify one or more reason above. Council can take no vote or action in Executive Session.
